If, like me, you're dreading the heat, you know June has arrived in the Queen City. Unlike ENS Baldwin, our native Texan, I am an avid enemy of the heat. So, this should serve as a reminder to me, and to you as well, to stay HYDRATED! I'm sure the doc will pass on the same reminder, so sorry for stealing your thunder, doc!

We have HEARD you all, and MAJOR changes are coming to our drills. Want to know what we have cooked up? Keep reading!

Starting with the next trip to the Naval Reserve Center for the 2024-25 duration, cadets from LTC, RTC, and ATC will be going ashore throughout the months to participate in critical infrastructure tours. There are 16 Critical Infrastructure sectors, plus some sub-sectors, deemed so necessary to our survival that any interruption or attack would have devastating effects on our communities and country. If you want to learn more about these sectors before we start the tours, visit Critical Infrastructure Sectors. More to come as winter approaches.

Next, more hands-on activities and practical applications are in store. The Division has completed its purchase of dock cleats and line for seamanship activities. With summer comes the Damage Control Simulator—bring your swimsuits and towels this month! Additionally, in August, we will host elements of the US Coast Guard, getting the entire unit certified in Basic Life Support (BLS) and Boater Safety. The Operations Department is open to additional suggestions for hands-on, skills-building activities we can do at the Ships, the NRC, or both, for little to no cost.

Now for the BIG stuff! Our Department is working to publish a new tool for the Division Officers, called a Navigation Plan, or NAVPLAN. This yearly release will contain all available tours, classes, activities, and more, allowing the DIVOs to select from a confirmed package of evolutions (minus O Division... Sorry, O Division). What's new in it from the usual, you ask? I'm glad you did and that you've read this far:

 Training - These are specialized trainings. We thought, WHY wait until training season when we can give you a taste at drill? We are planning training evolutions in Recruiting Duty, Food Services, Underway Replenishment (UNREP), Damage Control, Firefighting, Security Reaction Forces, Naval Construction, Public Affairs, and Coast Guard Specific Trainings! We will also have a quarterly medical stand-down to review and instruct on the BLS training content.

- Drills You can thank Recruit Rubinas for this idea. Let's bring back Swim Call!
 This will allow cadets to earn their swimmer class certifications and enjoy some EARNED time in the pool. We also plan a medical/damage control drill called SHAMROCK GUARDIAN, similar but on a smaller scale from what we did two years ago, and a security drill called ERIE SENTINEL. These will allow cadets to apply their training!
- Exercises We've developed frameworks for three exercises teaming up with US and Canadian military youth groups in Buffalo. These are:
 - MARITIME UNITY BI-LATERAL EXERCISE (MUBE): Partnering with US or Canadian Sea Cadet units
 - NORTH STAR BI-LATERAL EXERCISE (NSBE): Partnering with Civil Air Patrol or Canadian Air Cadets
 - SEA-LAND INTEGRATION
 EXERCISE (SLIC): Canadian Army cadets will join us for a weekend-long field operation.

These exercises will allow us to share knowledge, show off skills, and compete in team-building competitions

 Qualification/Certification - We want to make BLS and Boater Safety a regular occurrence. Staying knowledgeable in these areas can save lives. We have GREAT partners in the US Coast Guard to help with this.

- We are also looking at other US Coast Guard-specific opportunities, with more to come!
- Off-Site Trips Who doesn't love field trips? We are discussing the logistics for several near and far locations and hope to bring you these trips starting this winter!

Finally, what if we had our own version of Fleet Week? Wonder no more. We will be coordinating with the local military, DHS, and Naval Park to (hopefully) host a Fleet Week end onboard the ships in 2025! Recruiting, events, and fun!

I know I threw A LOT at you all. Much of it is still a work in progress, but we will build this airplane while we fly it. We appreciate all the input and assistance given, and invite more!

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION, REMINDERS, AND REQUESTS

-June *is* an overnight drill.

-Reminder: EVERY email that includes an officer as a recipient, MUST include a second officer. This is not just a unit regulation, it is a full program regulation set forth by National Headquarters. Please note: even though it's "in the name", a Petty Officer does *NOT* count as an Officer; the regulation is in regards to ADULT Officers.

-If you are unsure of how to "copy/cc" someone to an email, ask someone for help. It is imperative that this regulation be followed. Please use "cc", NOT "bcc".

-When you are sending an email to an officer, be sure to acknowledge WHO the email is directed at. Since you are required to include a second officer on emails, you need to make sure that the recipients are aware of who the email is actually directed at. Beginning an email without specifying who it is directed at is confusing to the recipients as well as disrespectful.

-For new cadets (and anyone else not sure)... **REMEMBER**: if you need to ask a question, make a request, share information, etc with an adult officer, you **NEED TO GO THROUGH YOUR CHAIN OF COMMAND**. That being said, any Cadet who is not in a leadership position should be calling or emailing their ACC (or CC if your company does not have an ACC) to begin the chain. **You do not contact senior leadership directly**, especially the CO and XO. Currently, the CC for League Cadets is LC2 Wadman. The CC for RTC is PO2 Pawli. The CC for ATC is PO2 Milewski. Those cadets will continue the chain until it reaches the

appropriate recipient and the issue will be resolved as necessary. Additionally, ACC's, CC's, LPO, CPO: you need to be checking your cadet email *daily*; you are in leadership positions and if your cadets are reaching out to senior leadership, YOU need to make sure it gets passed up.

-In order to see who reads the newsletter and who does not I am including this small quiz. You must follow the directions precisely in order to qualify, one mis-step and you are out. There will be a small prize issued to whoever follows all directions. If we have multiple valid responses I will draw the winner from a hat. On a plain piece of paper, folded in quarters, taped closed, write on the inside who founded the Sea Cadets, in the United States, and in what year. On the outside of the paper just write "To XO: Quiz" Everything must be precise, do not discuss with anyone, hand it to your chain. If your chain does not know what it is tell them it needs to go up to the XO.

-*** If you are a new cadet that has not yet received

uniforms, please wear the following: Plain Navy Blue T-Shirt, Plain Jeans (no rips), belt, black socks, sneakers. If you are officially signed on, be sure to bring PT gear as well (a plain dark colored or yellow t-shirt, and plain navy blue or black athletic shorts.) You can also bring or wear a *plain* Black or Navy Blue sweatshirt and sweatpants that fits appropriately.***



CPO UPDATE

** Chief Parish traveled to Australia via the USNSCC International Exchange Program! Read below to get all the technical details and her personal take in her own words!

Bravo Zulu, Chief!

International Exchange Program – Australia

On April 10, 2024, four cadets and two officers embarked on a training of a lifetime. Through the International Exchange Program application and interview process, they were accepted to attend the Australia Exchange for two and a half weeks. The exchange included two Australian Navy Cadets, two New Zealand cadets, and two Cayman Islands cadets. In total there were ten cadets and seven officers that joined forces for the exchange. Travel began on April 10 and the activities began on April 12th.

To begin, the exchanger's visited the Harbor side to view what they would be exploring over the next week. The Sydney Opera house and Harbor Bridge were attractions that were viewed quite often over the span of the exchange. On Sunday, the entire exchange group traveled to Fleet Engagement Camp (FEC). A nationwide event for the Australian Navy Cadets. There were close to 150 personnel that attended. They spent the week sleeping in tents, showering in outdoor stalls, and listening to Cockatoos (a bird) at all hours of the day and night on Cockatoo Island. Day activities included visiting HAMS bases and ships in the harbor, the New South Wales Maritime Police, and learning about the Australian Defense Force (ADF). All personnel were transported to and from activities on Navy Landing Craft (small boats).

The final night the personnel slept on board HAMS Canberra, a Navy Ship undergoing repairs. FEC was an amazing opportunity to be immersed into another country's Sea Cadet program.

Other activities for the exchangers included sailing, surfing, RIB driving, parachute school, Tribal Warrior Culture cruise, the Shoalhaven Zoo, a treetops high ropes course, Royal Australian Navy (RAN) Fleet Air Arm Museum, Australian National Maritime & Ships

Museum, and teambuilding.

To wrap up the exchange, on April 25 the exchanger's participated in Anzac Day services and a parade. Anzac Day is similar to the United States Memorial Day in that it is a remembrance of all the fallen military personnel. On April 25th, 1915, Australian and New Zealand troops started the campaign to capture the Gallipoli Peninsula. They were known as Anzac's, and this was the first time Australians saw combat. The focus of Anzac Day is the fallen soldiers during the campaign and World War 1 but is also used for all those who have fallen. Everyone had the honor of walking in the Sydney Anzac Day parade alongside TS Sydney, an Australian Navy Cadet unit.


Personal Statement:
